

Operation Cactus: Indian Intervention in Maldives - Nov 1988

November 3rd 1988 was a day unlike any others at the Agra Air Force station. A high alert had been issued. The airmen knew something was brewing but weren't told what or where. Two massive Illyushin IL 76 aircraft were made ready for immediate take off.

Doordarshan was flashing news clips of an attempted coup in the small island nation named Maldives. That was the clue everyone was waiting for. They had barely heard of this country. No maps were available. Fortunately the Indian ambassador to Maldives was in New Delhi on leave. He had a coffee table book with picture of the group of islands called Maldives. However information about the capital of Male and the airport on the Hulhule island was still scanty. Finally the Illyushins took off and what followed created history.

There had been attempted coup in Maldives by a bunch of local rebels aided my mercenaries from the Sri Lankan PLOTE Group. The rebels had attacked the presidential palace but President Gayoom and his family had managed to escape and reach a safe house. The Maldives officials staff had phoned India to ask for help and it was decided that the Indian Armed Forces would be deployed to rescue the President.

Of the 50 Independent Parachute Brigade, 6th battalion of the Parachute Regiment and the 17th Parachute Field Regiment were designated as the lead formations and they boarded the first two IL-76 transport aircraft. Grp Captain (Rtd) Anant Bewoor who piloted the first craft was the honoured speaker at a meeting held on 9th September 24. His account of 'Operation Cactus' as the mission was code named was as informative as it was thrilling.

Group Captain Bewoor is the recipient of the Vayu Sena Medal for Gallantry. During his years of service he had the distinction of flying 6 different types of aircraft and clocking a total of 5000 flying hours. He was specially selected for training in Russia for piloting the massive Illyushin. To give us an idea of its size Group Captain Bewoor projected a slide showing the cargo compartment of the aircraft loaded with not one but two Bofor artillery guns for being transported to Thoise which is in the Shyok valley North of the Indus valley.

In the evening of November 3rd 1988 Gp Captain Bewoor took off from Agra at 1800 hrs, and flew nonstop over a distance of 3000 kilometres to land at the Hulhule airport in total darkness. The runway lights could not be switched on for fear of alerting the rebels who had taken charge of the capital Male. The runway was on a small island called Hulhule. The runway lights came on about 30 seconds before actual touch-down. Bewoor made a perfect landing under the most daunting conditions. The Indian paratroopers first secured Hulhule and then went to the capital island of Male by boats and rescued the President taking full control of Male. Some rebels with their leader and Maldivian hostages had escaped in a hijacked ship but were intercepted and captured by two Indian Navy ships INS Betwa and INS Godavari. That was a classic high seas operation not done before. Thus ended a glorious chapter in India's military history. Within 16 hours of receiving an SOS from President Gayoom, Indian armed forces had carried out a highly successful operation on foreign soil without suffering any casualties.

Gp. Captain Bewoor mentioned the following as a key to the success of every mission the Indian Armed Forces have undertaken:

- Highest standard of tough training
- Anticipation and Preparation
- Initiative at every level
- Quick response

One more factor must be added to the above - a strong determination to win at any cost


The whole program was managed by Rtn Daljit Raizada very well. She requested the Rotarians and spouses to remain seated while the students left in a disciplined manner.

The Ornella School, the Church and the living quarters are spread over a large well maintained area. The chief Priest Father Louis who is a well read man, gave the history of this Church. It is the first Church in the western region and the land was given by Peshwa Sawai Madhavrao in 1780 AD to Goan (Portuguese) Catholics.

They proudly display a magnificent painting of the old Maratha Darbar, presented by Rtn Ramesh Bhagwat of RC Pune Parvati on the occasion of the 225th anniversary of Peshwa's Donation of land. They also started the Poona Goa Association in the same premises for their cultural and social activities within the complex facing Laxmi Road.

From here we proceeded to Gurdwara Hollywood across Gen Bewoor Road, Camp. The Granthiji was introduced by IPP Narendra to us and led us inside the temple. Here President Amar Krishna was resented a shawl by Granthiji whom Rtn Narendra referred as the Vazir of the kingdom of God. As Rtn Narendra spoke of Sikhism,



one wondered who the actual Vazir was. The Peace March had ended at the footsteps of the Gurdwara long back. Now the conflict resolution demanded satisfaction of the angering gastric juices building up within the stomach.

At Rosary School, one of the preachers told us that the idea of Peace within the heart; another preacher declared that when the idea of peace travels north, from the heart upwards to the brain, conflicts get resolved in the brain. Now, the listening party was acutely sensing the emergence of a conflict somewhere below the heart.

The granthiji, wise as he is, sensed it and ended his peace sermon. As soon as it ended, the troops moved out into the war zone to fight out the appetite in the Langar.

Funnily, all Marches, Morchas, Bandhs and Fasts begin on a full stomach and end on an empty one. Do then all conflicts arise out of poverty and hunger, the alleviation of which is the hallmark of a global grant of the Rotary Foundation? the answer may be a resounding "YES".

It is thanks to the initiative of Dr. Mridula Deshpande that our Club was able to successfully execute the donation of 18 Advanced Modular Feet (AMF), as part of our Artificial Limbs Project under the Community Service Avenue (CSA).

The Programme was held at the workshop of the Navbharat Vikas Foundation on Friday, the 20th September.

It was conducted in a structured and an efficient manner by Mr. Khatavkar, the spirit behind the project. He spoke at length about the Foundation, it's origins,

it's history and the exemplary work that they have done, both, in making them after thorough research and in distributing them TOTALLY FREE OF CHARGE to the deserving beneficiaries from distant districts of Maharashtra.

PP. Atre too spoke and gave his valuable inputs and advice to the Recipients.

However, the stand-out feature was the manner in which the dedicated staff and the physios from the Ferguson College fitted each of the AMFs with extreme patience, care and consideration to the satisfaction of the beneficiaries.

The Recipients were were explained in the use of the AMF, the initial discomfort that they would cause, and it's various advantages over that of the Jaipur Foot.

A total amount of Rs. 2,08,000/- (at Rs. 12,000 per foot) was donated, of which Rs. 72,000 was by our Trust, Rs. 1 lakh by PP. Pradeep Rathi, P P C.D. Agarwal and Rs. 12,000 each by Ann. Dilshad and daughter Khushnaz from Canada.

It was very heartening to see nearly 20 Rotarians and Anns attending the function with enthusiasm and empathy in their hearts.

Stephanie A. Urchick Rotary International President, 2024-2025: Shares Her Experience

September 2024

The Magic of Rotary is belonging, and it's a feeling that can appear when you least expect it.

Earlier this year, I was in Slovakia serving as a president's representative during a six-week trip through Europe. When I wrote to Katarina Cechova, governor of District 2240 at the time, I mentioned that my grandmother Veronica Zilka grew up in a small village in the area before settling in the U.S.

It wasn't long before Cechova tracked down my grandmother's village, Jakubova Vol'a. She even organized a visit for me, where I received an unforgettable Slovakian welcome.

When I entered the community center of Jakubova Vol'a, a small crowd of people dressed in traditional Slovakian clothing greeted me. They sang with beautiful and powerful Central European voices that reminded me of my grandmother.



A lot of families play cards or games when they get together. When I was young, my father would pick up his accordion and lead my family in song. My grandmother would sing along with her impressive voice.

When I walked into the community center and heard traditional music from my childhood — when I saw a woman play the accordion the way my dad played — I suddenly felt like a little girl sitting at my grandmother's house in Monessen, Pennsylvania. I burst into tears of joy at the memories.

But the magic didn't stop there. District Governor Cechova really outdid herself. A local genealogist worked with a videographer to make a short film about my grandmother. We watched the video together in the community center.

When the video ended, I turned around and saw a man standing in the back of the room. I quickly learned that this stranger, Frantisek Zilka, was my second cousin. His grandmother and mine had been sisters. I felt like I had been struck by lightning.

I visited my newfound cousin's home, which happens to be the home where my grandmother was born. There, he shared old photographs I had never seen of my dad, my uncle, and my grandmother.

Since then, I can't stop thinking about my family of Rotary. When I refer to you as my family, I'm not just being kind. I really think of everyone in Rotary as my family. But I never would have imagined that my Rotary family would introduce me to long-lost personal family.

Sitting in that community center listening to traditional Slovakian music from my childhood filled me with joy and a profound sense of belonging. I am so grateful to District Governor Cechova and everyone who helped create that magical experience.

As members of Rotary, we have a unique opportunity to share the same magic with each other and with the world. I encourage you to consider how you can help spread that magic and ensure other members of your club — other members of our Rotary family — feel like they truly belong.

ABOUT ROTARY EMBLEM (WHEEL)

Back in 1905, an engraver and Chicago Rotarian, Montague Bear, designed a simple Rotary wagon wheel, showing movement and dust. It was meant to represent civilization, movement and service work in action. Over time, many Rotary clubs adopted the wheel in one form or another.

In 1922 it was decided to create and develop an official Rotary emblem and in 1923 a gear with 24 teeth and six spokes was officially adopted. To me, the gear teeth around the outside represent the fact that work is to be done.

The six spokes represent the inner direction and path of our Vocational Service, through the representation of our membership via the classification system.
